It is difficult at first to know what to make of the sepia-toned photographs of elephants found inside *Ashes and Snow, Book N^OI*. Are they religious tributes to sacred elephants? Eulogies for dead elephants? Meditations on the relationship between humans and elephants? Protests against the ivory trade? Something else entirely? Each photograph seems to support a different conclusion. With its simple, unassuming binding, mysterious title, and sparing text, the book isn't keen on answering questions but certainly raises some powerful ones. A film component of *Ashes and Snow* has also been produced, and the project is currently travelling as a "nomadic" exhibition. The book has a hand-made, rough paper binding with bamboo fasteners and a yarn cord. It is in fine condition.
